TREASONABLE TALK OF LITTLE IN BUTTE MAY BE CAUSE OF HANGING

Spoke of Soldiers as "Uncle Sam's Scabs in Uniforms." Said That if Government Took Over Butte Mines the I. W. W. Would "Make it So Damned Hot for the Government That They Could Not Send Troops to France." Upbraided by Governor Campbell.

Salt Lake City, Aug. 1.—F. H. Little, the I. W. W. organizer lynched today at Butte, telegraphed Governor Campbell of Arizona from here July 17 as follows regarding the deportation from that state of members of the I. W. W.: "Understand that the mine owners' mob will take same action at Globe and Miami as was taken at Bisbee. The membership of the I. W. W. is getting tired of the lawlessness of the capitalistic class and will no longer stand for such action. If you, as governor, cannot uphold the law, we will take same into our own hands. Will you act or must we?"

In reply, Governor Campbell said he felt sure no deportations could occur with the federal troops stationed in the district and that he was using his best efforts to protect rights of all citizens. Concluding, he said: "I resent your untimely threats in view of my earnest efforts to bring law and order and such forces as will maintain same, and further like behavior on your part will be punished to the full extent of my authority."

SOME OF THE THINGS LITTLE SAID HERE

Some of the treasonable utterances made by Frank Little since his arrival in Butte three weeks ago and which the authorities declare are responsible for his death follow:

"Down in the hot deserts of Arizona they have taken 2,000 of our men (I. W. W.) guarded by the uniformed thugs of the United States government and shut them up in Pershing's bull pen."

In a speech at the ball park in Butte on July 19, Little spoke of the

W. refuse to go to war is to organize into one big union and fight the capitalists. The I. W. W. did not object to war, but the way they wanted to fight was to put the capitalists in the front trenches and if the Germans did not get them the I. W. W. would. Then the I. W. W. would clean the Germans. The capitalists are our worst enemies."

"We have no interest in the war. Our interest is solely with the working class. We do not care what the nations of America, England, Germany and Russia do."

"Our proposed nation-wide strike would be the culmination of some hundred walkouts which have occurred in the last few months. We never sign contracts, but reserve the right to strike any time we think we are able to win."

"Let the capitalists fight the battle and we will go into the munition plants and see that they get plenty of bullets."

"It is a waste of time to send resolutions to the president. The only thing to do is for workers to form a big army and go before the president and demand that if the men deported at Bisbee are not released immediately, the army will turn itself loose."

"I am an I. W. W., and as an I. W. W. I am responsible for what I say. The place to start is to handle the scabs; forget the quiet stuff and use action."

WILL ADVERTISE FOR Y. M. C. A. BIDS

Executive Committee to Issue Call to Contractors Tonight.

At a meeting of the executive committee of the Butte Young Men's Christian association this evening arrangements will be made for advertising for bids for the construction of the building. It is expected that the bids will be submitted in three weeks' time. Architect Floyd Hamill has returned from Chicago, where he consulted with the official Y. M. C. A. firm of architects in regard to certain changes which were made necessary because of the excavations made for ore bodies and of the hanging wall which was discovered on the northeast corner of the lot at Park and Washington streets.

It is expected that the work will be started at once. Every effort will be made to have the work completed before the winter weather, as the executive committee believes the fact that this nation is at war with Germany will bring added duties to the door of the Y. M. C. A. organization.

HEAT WAVE CAUSES 21 DEATHS IN 24 HOURS

Chicago, Aug. 1.—Twenty-one deaths attributed to the present record-breaking heat wave were reported in this city in the past 24 hours.

Philadelphia reported 26 additional deaths, making a total of 39 in the past two days, and New York 25 deaths and scores of prostrations as a result of the heat wave.

Pittsburg reported 15 deaths; Detroit, 10, and Cleveland, 15.

A hail storm last night in southern Minnesota did thousands of dollars of damage to crops. Cooling thunder showers were reported from Iowa and Kansas.

The highest temperature in the United States was reported from Red Bluff, Cal., with 104 degrees.

Advocated Same Methods in Butte, in Speech Friday Night.

During one of the riots inside the jail the fire department was called out and a stream of water turned on the prisoners who were flooded into submission in their cells. Before a meeting of miners in Finlander hall in Butte last Friday night Little urged the same course as that adopted in Fresno in 1910.

"Get out and put on a picket," he said that night. "Send 20 men the first day and let them lead out and fill the jails and let them go and then 100. Fall and let them go and then 100. Look the city daddies in the face and tell them to go to hell; also their city ordinances and laws."

OPINION OF F. H. MOORE.
Columbus, N. M., Aug. 1.—"The action of the men in Butte in hanging Frank Little will cement the loyalty of the I. W. W. throughout the country." Fred H. Moore, attorney for the I. W. W., said today here in the detention camp at Columbus.

Moore declined to answer a query as to what effect the hanging in Butte would have upon the labor situation in Arizona as related to the I. W. W. movement.

HIS RECORD IN ARIZONA.
Miami, Ariz., Aug. 1.—Frank Little, industrial worker of the World leader, took an active part in the strike of members of that body here and in Globe, other leaders of that body said today. Little, suffering from here, lay in a miner's cabin here, unknown to peace officers of the Broken League, and transacted business as an executive board member of the organization. Little reached here shortly before the calling of the strike of the Metal Mine Workers' Industrial union

in this district July 2 and remained until able to travel.

Little is said to have aided in organizing the strike at Bisbee as a result of which about 1,200 men were deported from that city by officers and citizens.

HIS SPOKANE CAREER.
Spokane, Aug. 1.—Frank H. Little, lynched today in Butte, spent several weeks in the county jail here in 1909 as the result of the free speech fight precipitated by Industrial Workers of the World.

W. leader, Frank Little, at Butte this morning, said: "I have had no exact or detailed information regarding the event and I know nothing about it save what I have heard on the streets. I have nothing to say on the subject at present."

Attorney General Ford said today that he will interest himself in the case and had communicated with County Attorney Jackson at Butte asking for a statement of the facts surrounding the lynching.

MURDERERS MUST BE FOUND, THEY SAY

Federal and County Officers Denounce the Little Tragedy.

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
